**Homeless Scam Cash-Cow Continues, Backed by Greedy Politicians See Feedback & 1<sup>st</sup> Article**

## \$1,700 a Month? Sorry, but somebody had to write this.

**\$1,700 a month.** That is how much money a person makes who is working full-time, 40 hours a week, at San Diego Minimum Wage. After deductions, it comes to a little less. **\$1,700 a month.** That is also how much the least-expensive room or apartment costs for one person. Coincidence? The figure applies to apartments that are NOT subsidized by the government nor religious private donors, but rather rented at the Going Rate. Everything less than that amount was torn down by the Redevelopment Successor Agency, also known as Civic San Diego, Downtown Partnership, and Clean and Safe. This has already been done.

How many units torn down? 19,500 low-price units, declared "Blighted" for renting for less than **\$1,700 per month**. This resulted in our 19,500 (?) homeless, less than half of them ever counted. I class homeless by how hidden they are. We "Classification 4" homeless are almost never found nor counted. So, what else is **\$1,700 per month**?

The cost of housing **one person** in one of the three new rubber tents recently installed. And, those tents only house, total, 5% to 10% of our homeless, the rest still being out on the sidewalk. They make it look dramatic, like something is really being done, even though it isn't. Of course, nothing useful has ever been done on the San Diego homeless problem in the past 30 years that I have been an advocate, but pretend.

Pretend the homeless have programs that help. Pretend they haven't been ignored for 30 years. Pretend that the City and County have plans, real plans, to reduce how many homeless were intentionally created by real estate developers. If you pretend enough, the Mayor's lies make sense, sort of.

Don't blame the Mayor, though, because he is just following orders from the Goombahs (wealthy gangsters) that got him elected. The Downtown Chargers stadium was not his idea, nor the new Mission Valley Chargers stadium. Major League Soccer was not his idea, either, and also not a new Convention Center expansion. The guy has way better brains than all that. Taxpayers can get suckered in and lose money on all this stuff, proving that we are just as stupid as other cities, right? Right?

Getting back to **\$1,700 a month**, instead of housing a small fraction of the homeless in tents, we could for the same money give each one of them a full-time job. Then they could pay for their own housing? Nope. That's exactly the price of the least-expensive housing available, **\$1,700 a month**. Sounds nice though, doesn't it?

Why not put all of them to work manufacturing housing? All of this spending on tents is drawing money away from building new housing. In a city that has torn down 1,000 low-income rental units per year

(and 4,000 the year Petco Park began), replacing those units with only 300 brand-new units per year, we should be able to expect 700 new homeless every year, because of the 700 fewer low-cost rentals, right? The other problem, of course, is that the rents on the new 300 units created every year are more than double what the older, torn-down apartments rented for. And, salaries did not double.

How much money do you need to make to afford the least-expensive **\$1,700 a month** housing? At rent being 30% of income, \$5,666 a month, which is \$35 an hour, 40 hours a week. So do we need powerful labor unions, rent control, and lots of guns and ammo? Actually, all it would take is for everybody to move out of downtown, the same thing that happened in Las Vegas about 8 years ago. It doesn't help that we spend over \$300,000 on each new homeless person that is housed, so there will never be an end to the homeless Cash Cow economy. For that kind of cash we could buy each one their own free-standing home, single-family, even somewhere in San Diego. Why do we do it the way we do? Because construction companies, materials suppliers, etc. need to get money so that they return some of it as political contributions to our politicians. People are suffering as homeless just so our present politicians can stay in office and the news media can make millions selling political advertising. Welcome to Reality.

### Thoughts and Solutions:

Continuing to spend \$300,000 per homeless housed would take \$5.1 billion to end homelessness that way (17,000 San Diego homeless) or \$2.7 billion if our total is 9,000. Will that ever happen? So, what is our best-case scenario?

Allow parked RV's in designated spots, never having to move. Force wages to go up and low-end housing rents to go down. Bring in developers of low-cost housing. Permit many "tiny homes" shacks without many restrictions. Utilize some of the money collected from developers in return for not allowing low-cost housing in their developments. Stop building so much super-expensive PSH (Permanent Supportive Housing, like PATH, Alpha Square, and Father Joe's Villages). A jail is not a home, no matter how well-meaning it is. Stop harassing and jailing our homeless, who have done nothing wrong. The City has better things to spend money on.

Stop listening to Mayor Faulconer and Chris Ward. All that is planned is ways to make the homeless less visible, and make it look like "lots of money" is being spent on "great solutions", a whole lot of visible but useless things to gather Public Relations spin for the upcoming elections. Nothing else. **All plans combined so far would help only 5% to 10% of the homeless**, so what about the other 90-95%? All of our shelters are FULL, except for the many beds which MUST, by contract, remain empty, in order to say that there is empty space, even though no one gets to use that so-called empty space.

Money is spent wastefully, in no way helping solve the total numbers of homeless in our cities. It is just corrupt politics. Does your government unit or nonprofit organization reduce the number of homeless, or does it just transfer them from one type of homeless to another type of homeless, by putting them in a shelter? Most organizations do not change the number of homeless at all, just deal with the problems the real estate debacle causes for society. How many get real housing that is not shelters nor institutions? Why not have jobs that pay enough money to afford rent? Nobody should be given "free"

anything unless they cannot be found a reasonable job instead. Then, it becomes society's responsibility.

## The Mayor's Speech:

Got lied to a lot last year, and so did not cover it. Reporting lies never interested me. As far as the PITC (Point-In-Time-Count) goes, if 17,500 people asked for help because of being homeless, individually identified as to not include duplicates, **how is that 9,000 homeless?** Why do the 3 rubber tents, parking overnight and sleeping in cars, and all other interventions combined, **only serve 5 to 10 percent** of our homeless? What about the other 90-95% who do not get helped with all these "NEW" interventions?

## Feedback:

I got some flak about challenging the sincerity of our politicians, especially Chris Ward, but my premise is simple: **Are they helping end the homeless problem, a housing problem, or are they trying to blame the homeless for being homeless and instead trying to solve the problems the homeless situation creates for society?** With all the politicians, it is the latter, solving the problems for society that homelessness creates, rather than dealing with the root issue, lack of housing.

Ward is not the big problem, as he has personally inspected all of the potential new storage places for homeless possessions, including the old downtown library site, but even he has not suggested any plan which would end the present homeless Cash Cow system, solving our homeless and housing problem. Nor has the RTFH (Regional Task Force on the Homeless) which he vice-chairs. Originally the Mayor's Task Force on the Homeless, this group helps bring in federal HUD money, mostly, which reduces the City's cost of having its present (and past) real estate practices. This is counter-productive, because it allows cost-reduction of maintaining the present Cash Cow system, helping same continue. It makes having so many homeless less expensive. We instead need to make it so expensive to have so many homeless that it costs the city billions of dollars each day, and then things would change. Abolish HUD? And they call me a Liberal.

There are proposals which would shut down the Cash Cow and end homelessness, but there is so much money to be made for the friends and families of our respected politicians that these potentially-successful plans are neither being implemented nor considered. One of them is "Tiny Homes" which would give each homeless person, immediately, a garden shed to store their possessions and sleep in. No more junk all over the streets, no more "zoo" homeless in public view, shelter is provided from rain, sun, and cold, and all at a minimal cost to society, about a thousand dollars per person housed this way. Compare that with our present system of spending \$300,000 and up for each homeless person housed. Hell, you can get a whole single-family house for that amount, even in San Diego! The primary advantage of Tiny Homes is to provide housing instantly, minimizing trauma, and catching the problem long before homelessness causes the additional expensive problems of alcoholism, drug abuse, and mental illness.

Our present system waits until the additional problems occur, and then cashes in on them, providing "support services" such as psychiatrists, psychologists, medical care, substance abuse

counselors, medicine, and a host of other services to make money on, since there isn't a big profit in low-end housing. My big complaint is that this system greedily damages innocent people, costing taxpayers a fortune for each person slowly and eventually housed, while others suffer and become damaged, plus the ongoing annual costs are staggering, and take money away from the housing construction process. Add in the 19,500 low-income "Blighted" housing units torn down by the Redevelopment and Successor Agencies, and you get evidence of an intentional homeless problem.

**I would like the perpetrators of the planning that led to this fiasco held accountable for their malfeasance in their fiduciary responsibilities to the public.** Yes, they quintupled the price of real estate, making billionaires in the process, but they only collected tiny amounts, comparatively, to deal with the homeless that they knew would be caused. Most involved are a Who's Who of famous politicians, including former Mayor and Police Chief Jerry Sanders, Toni Atkins and **her wife** Jennifer LeSar of LeSar Development, Ben Hueso, Todd Gloria, and many more. An all-star cast. They created the Cash Cow system of redevelopment, homeless creation, unaffordable real estate, rampant Gentrification, and Public Relations cover-ups. Even the excellent editorial staff of San Diego CityBeat bought into the City's propaganda press-release, repeating "More than 3,500 low-income rental properties were torn down the past 15 years." Yes, the 19,500 low-income units torn down by Redevelopment in that time period are certainly "More than 3,500". Petco Park started the present flood of homeless, costing 4,000+ their homes. Blame Major League Baseball? Hardly, but they were a player. The object was to reduce the amount of available downtown real estate, a supply-and-demand thing. **If you bought real estate in San Diego, you helped make homeless the people who got their home torn down to build yours.**

So the fault lies everywhere, but folks want to ignore the corruption in Sunny San Diego and delegate to the government and nonprofits the task of dealing with the homeless and solving the homeless problem that real estate development created. Hey, welcome to America's Homeless City!

So, those who read the above and balked at my including Chris Ward, here's the stuff on that: I first suspected Ward was just being a shrewd politician with his "homeless suggestions" when I interviewed his Personal Representative, Roberto Alcantar, at a meeting of the East Village Residents Group. I identified myself as Press, and he did not request anonymity nor that I hold anything secret. He downplayed the role of Ward in dealing with homelessness, and referred me to Lori Saldaña. This particular meeting was ABOUT homelessness in the East Village. Also Ward's comments on Todd Gloria and the Mayor's plans clearly identify him as a Gentrifier and not a friend of the homeless. Notice how all the non-river, non-beach homeless areas got gerrymandered into his district? Was that accidental? Ward and Mayor Faulconer have the same fundraiser, and both are committed to increasing the value of real estate. For example, Chris Ward voted to allow more conversion of San Diego rental housing into vacation time-shares or rentals, voting against Barbara Bry's more conservative proposal. All of this took a lot of time and investigative work, but you are welcome to disagree with my findings. For you to have accurate information, you would need a presence behind the scenes, which is why we have news reporters.

## Reality Check

A change is necessary in our Operations In order to reflect the latest Best Practices. Covering meetings is not very efficient in time usage, because it is unlikely that anything dealt with will have an impact on the number of homeless. What everybody is trying to solve is the problems that homelessness CAUSES for society, not the problem of HAVING homeless in the first place. The base problem is that population exceeds housing and job creation. The Unemployment Rate is low? Doesn't matter. President Nixon changed the Unemployment Rate formula to merely indicate the latest **changes** in how many folks are employed. An unemployment rate of zero is prosperity. The economy is booming? Only for the top 1%, while the rest of us are suffering. Can't decrease population short of a war or epidemic, but unionization will improve our economy. The Lower Middle Class no longer exists, the Middle Class itself is severely threatened, and the Lower Class is expanding rapidly. Add **250% inflation** the past ten years at the **low-income levels** of society ONLY.

The Middle Class is in a housing crisis of its own in San Diego, and has an even bigger crunch than the poor people, with far less housing available and far more ridiculous prices. Middle Class folks are faced with the problem of either having to move out of San

Diego, or live in Lower Class housing, further depleting the supply of same. Is this all in preparation for the day that there is no Middle Class at all? Society will fall if not assisted by the Professionals of the Middle Class! Flow Chart:

**Insufficient Housing**, resulting in:

**Homeless**, resulting in:

A **myriad of problems** dealing with homeless, resulting in:

Nonprofits and government agencies **dealing with the special problems** created, resulting in:

**Huge costs to society**, ongoing.

If there is to be a housing shortage, only a shortage of housing for the Ruling Class is not disruptive, because they have the money to have a new home built, or they can either stay in a hotel temporarily, or stay in Middle Class housing temporarily. San Diego overbuilding Ruling Class housing while ignoring other housing needs may be wishful thinking, but it caused our homeless problem and all of our housing problems in general. **The fix? Let the builders of Middle Class and Lower Class housing have their projects approved, not ignored and disallowed. None of this needs to cost the taxpayers anything.** The homeless problem had to have been intentionally created by planning agencies, and has only recently drawn the ire of voters. So, now we are seeing an effort to REDUCE it, not ELIMINATE it. The Cash Cow of homeless help has taken over the whole barn.

## Meetings:

**The new format is not to cover each meeting, but only a few important points. In general, nothing is done at any of these meetings that actually improves the number of homeless.**

**Think Dignity, [www.ThinkDignity.Org](http://www.ThinkDignity.Org)** formerly the Girls Think Tank, meets the First Thursday of every month, usually at the Monicker Warehouse, 705 16<sup>th</sup> St., near 16<sup>th</sup> and G, downtown San Diego. 6 to 7 PM. The first Thursday of January, Jan. 4, ten were present, which is average, but I was the only homeless person present, which is very unusual. Announcements:

**Tony The Movie** will be shown on Monday, Jan. 29, at the Downtown Library Neil Morgan Auditorium, 6:30 PM. Tony himself uses the Downtown Storage Center for homeless possessions, and the movie is his story of being homeless in San Diego.

**Legal Clinics** are being held at new times, by telephone only, every Thursday. Phone (619) 354-9879 from 6 to 7 PM Thursdays ONLY.

Current projects are to help de-criminalize homelessness, get a subsidy for MTS passes, and put a new storage center in operation, possibly at the old Downtown library. Current storage contract with the City runs out this year, and there are currently 130 persons on waiting lists for storage spaces.

My humorous adage this meeting was, "Now that the homeless are tented, they won't have any termites."

**The truth is that less than 15% of San Diego's unsheltered homeless will have any shelter at all this winter, despite all the fuss, tents, sleep-in-your-car programs, etc. both planned and in-use. This is a complete failure by government, advocates, planning agencies, nonprofits, and the public, at dealing with this problem. ♦♦♦♦♦**

## The Regional Task Force on the Homeless Governing Board

meets monthly, on the third Thursday, 3-5 PM, at the County Administration Building, 1900 Pacific Highway, downtown, 3<sup>rd</sup> floor. They are a major player at dealing with HUD and obtaining money for homeless programs. They are only a minor player at building new housing, mostly insisting that institutional housing such as Father Joe's and Alpha Square be built, something HUD calls PSH, for Permanent Supportive Housing. That's a hospital or resort or prison for people who are drug addicts, mentally ill, handicapped, or retired and need a lot of medical care. It isn't really "housing" as in free-standing or apartments.

The mission of the RTFH is to push as much money into San Diego as possible, so it makes jobs for drug counselors, intake caseworkers, housing navigators, psychiatrists, psychologists, physicians, lawyers, cooks, security guards, data processors, real estate developers, public relations specialists, construction companies and their materials suppliers, administrators, and way more. All these jobs is why PSH is preferable, financially, to just ordinary housing.

The Regional Task Force receives between \$78 million and \$82 million a year in HUD federal money, to keep PATH Connections Housing, Father Joe's, and other agencies running and taking care of the "supportive" needs of people. All these agencies are Nonprofits, but they use tax money, so every dollar you donate is one less dollar they get from the government. Thank you for supporting the U.S. Treasury with your donations.

Some of the most important work done by RTFH is to make sure that all of the local charities and government agencies meet all of their filing deadlines for filing HUD papers. And, that it is all filed correctly, bearing all of the required serial numbers, attachments, statements, and other legal requirements. RTFH and its clients, the HUD-money nonprofits, get help from the Procopio Law Firm in this respect. All of the grant papers are looked at closely to make sure everything is in order. RTFH makes sure everyone knows how to fill out each piece of paperwork properly, and then checks those papers using experts, tax lawyers, and retired HUD officials. They also rate nonprofits as to their effectiveness, using a scoring system designed by the nonprofits themselves. The Regional Task Force is a Central Intake Facility for federal money.

RTFH also provides a forum at its meetings for announcements and suggestions as well as networking and learning. The biggest pearl in the smelly mollusk of homeless services is they provide for the coordination of services among agencies of different types: City, county, federal, veterans, nonprofit independents, churches, membership orgs, and more. This allows for a Master Plan and the avoidance of duplication of services. In addition, RTFH is the data collection agency for the PITC, the HUD-required Point-In-Time Count of the homeless, and administers both the CES (Coordinated Entry System) of data collection and the HMIS (Homeless Management Information System) data-base of data collected. **The latter contains data on all homeless . programs, agencies, and persons, including how they fit in with the jail and hospital system. Organizations which do the best get cash bonuses.

Data tells us what works best for our tax dollars. Many homeless will not give their data, avoiding future repercussions and blackballing for having been homeless.

### News Media News:

News 8 was sold to a less-conservative media company, which was inevitable. When I attended the Town and Country (Mayor Faulconer, Stacey Spector, and Lori Zapf) Homeless Town Hall meeting, I stated on-air over News 8 that all the homeless needed was jobs that pay enough money to pay rent. That's very conservative, and I never heard the end of it. You're welcome. The last bastion of super-conservative news slant, locally, is KUSI, TV-51, but both ABC

Walt Disney Mormon News 10 and Arabian Oil owned FOX have been a huge challenge in that regard, too. Much of our TV is clone operations out of Los Angeles. The biggest Fake News I ever broke was called Iran-Contra. It prevented the re-election of President George H. Bush, paving the way for Bill Clinton.

### Other News:

Construction has (had\*) the Handicapped Lane at the old San Ysidro pedestrian border closed, causing people to have to wait two hours while standing on crutches. I spoke to the Homeland Security leaders and they promised resolution. Tijuana has always, not merely recently, been a refuge for those who cannot afford the prices in San Diego, be that a one-dollar Corona, Tecate, or Pacifico beer at a sidewalk café, or even a hotel for a short stay between apartment rentals. Welcome to San Diego! A new hospital is being built at the border, affiliated with

Sharp Healthcare. They will be able to use whatever new technology is not yet legal in the United States. \*The problem was corrected since this article was written.

Per the San Diego Downtown News, the Quaryard, a beer venue with dog amenities, will be re-opened one block east on 13<sup>th</sup> and Market, sometime in February. Will the Portland Loo toilet taken out at the old location also be re-opened?
