## **Notice of News Backlog**

Our other newspaper, Homeless City News, needed to be published because of impending events. It is rarely published, often only available in hard copy (paper and ink) and distributed only to the street homeless. Some got a copy at Project Homeless Connect, Jan. 25. So much happened so quickly that we have for the first time ever had 3 editions only 17 days apart. There is a backlog of news that did not fit into any edition, which has never happened before in our eight years of publication. •

### **Homeless Funding Suggestions:**

Bryan Pease, who was a candidate for San Diego City Attorney, has suggested that the Chargers Early Termination Fee be used 100% for housing for our homeless. This sentiment was repeated by Change.Org and KPBS. Pease is on Facebook. Some of the Facebook pages refuse to allow postings of his (and mine). There were also ideas surfacing that suggested Qualcomm Stadium as a new homeless shelter, as it already has plenty of toilets, showers, cooking facilities, and trolley access. The new Convention Center Expansion should also function as a homeless shelter, whenever it is not being needed for a convention. All of these buildings cost the taxpayers a lot of ongoing money, and we need to get as much use out of that money as possible. Done correctly,

Qualcomm Stadium could also be used for stadium events, such as concerts.

### Regional Homeless Plan Contract Awarded

The RTFH (Regional Task Force on the Homeless) and the RCCC (Regional Continuum of Care Council) have awarded the contract to come up with the Regional Plan to end homelessness to Sacramento-based Focus Strategies, a 9person group that has had successes in Seattle and San Francisco, and has written plans for many other cities as well. ### **Caught Up in the Drug Wars**

On Jan. 16, Martin Luther King Jr. Day, huge quantities of narcotics arrived in Tijuana, leading to my being robbed the

following day. My survival until I get paid Feb. 1 became very questionable, so I needed to ask for help, which I rarely do. I intended to ask the Third Avenue Charitable Organization, TACO, (First Lutheran Church, downtown San Diego, 3rd and Ash St.) for money to get by, but recently learned that they are cash-strapped, their restrooms are closed, and they are laying off staff. Ouch. I only go to them as a last resort. The Lutherans in general have been far more humane than any other group I have associated with, much to their credit. I did receive help from a friend, and mention that in my first article, on the Women's March.

Originally, even my logs and journals were stolen, the original hand-written copies, but those were found by the operatives I deal with there. I had them in Mexico to complete an Index project the day before, and without that Index would not even know what's missing. Thanks much. If Trump expands Deportations, that will further cripple the city, because Tijuana already gets as many as a thousand deportees a week, and has no housing nor jobs for them, except in the dope business, dealing with methamphetamine, cocaine, crack, and heroin. Other problems are that a Republican Mayor in Tijuana was replaced by election with a Democrat, which always leads to drug cartel wars, and has resulted in the **deadliest 6 months in Tijuana history regarding drug-related murders.** 

Officially, of course, the Knights Templar, which runs the Bar, worldwide, is considered a Terrorist Group in Mexico, and there are sometimes radio ads warning about them. I am not making this up, but really wish I was. Yes, the same Bar runs the legal system and courts in the United States, and having been a victim of their conspiracies many times, I, (like Mexico) also consider them a terrorist conspiracy organization. I write about that elsewhere and for over 35 years now. Mexico is instead run by 12 Jewish families, but you already know that, right? I mention the Lutherans being humane, but many of the Jews have been that, too. Thanks to everyone as warranted. My 21-year-old food pantry and soup kitchen had to permanently close.

# **Women's March** Overwhelms Transit, Police, Traffic Management, even in the rain

On Friday, January 20, Inauguration Day, I heard Emergency Alert tones on the radios of many people. Nuclear War? No, just an incoming severe storm. The following day, a friend of mine (Katheryn Rhodes) helped me financially on the way to the Women's March. I arrived an hour early (9 AM) and stayed until noon. I was so impressed with the crowd and its enthusiasm, despite the pouring rain, that I wrote a story for the media on my Wire Service Page. I would miscalculate the crowd (using scientific procedures) because San Diego has 16 city blocks per mile, not 8. Correcting that, my crowd figures are 100-125 thousand, a very good showing. I estimated crowds for the police years ago, and for the news media since, and was told that the mainstream press would go with one-third of whatever the official number of attendees was in the police report. The police I spoke with said there were 60-90 thousand, so the conventional news media kept their promise and reported 20-30 thousand, as agreed upon, with three different columnists at CityBeat (Alternate Media) using 40,000. Comparatively, San Diego Reader had no word at all of the march in its Jan. 26 edition. Compare my lowest figure and the highest one of the police, and you get 90-100 thousand as the truth. If you're in the news media, you know how all this works. It's politics. Donald Trump has a problem with the Inauguration attendance numbers? Okay, but did you know there is now a Media Blackout ordered on a number of things, and the new FCC Commissioner wants to **shut down dissent** on the web?

The crowd was orderly, well-organized, tightly-packed (perhaps dangerously so), colorful, personal in being all home-made, and definitely huge. Biggest crowd I have seen at such a demonstration in San Diego, although I try to avoid events due to the risk involved. Streets and sidewalks both were impassible by motor vehicle, and all bus and trolley service had to be cancelled, the vehicles not even being able to turn around and return to their starting points. Police were minimal, expecting a much smaller turnout, especially due to rain both during the event and the night before, when San Diego saw a major storm that knocked out much of its electrical power and trolley service. Many had signs of protest or similar messages, especially about the rights of women, healthcare, objections to

President Trump's Cabinet picks, and objections to much of what is being done by Congress. Radio stations carried parts of the event live, for those with radios in the crowd to be able to hear speeches, but the number of things occurring simultaneously, city blocks apart from each other, made it impossible to see or hear all of it. There were 8 staging areas, including the City Hall Concourse, Horton Plaza Park, and much of Broadway, C Street, and 4th, 5th, and 6th Avenues. By noon, two hours later, transit would begin to return to normal. The real story, however, is in the photos. More of them are shown at NZ9F.com/M, my Media Wire Service page, and will be archived on an M-Page of their own.

In criticism, people responded that it was not clear whether this was a protest, an expression of wants and needs, a show of force in numbers, a rally to garner support, or whatever. And, I asked around, with little success. I think it was all of those. Comments were received that the news media should shut up whenever people protest, or make those participating look like lunatics and dangerous hysterical rioters who need to be imprisoned for terrorism. Some thought that they were all hired by George Soros, and there were objections that they are protesting about civil rights that they already have. The participants were called Mentally Deranged, which I answered, citing both Hitler and the Soviet Union as abusing mental health laws in order to end protests. Fortunately, neither Nazi Germany nor the Soviet Union exist anymore.

**In Unauthorized History**, the Rights of Women took the fast track beginning in 1962 when President Kennedy received word from the ET guys that our planet was 100 times more crowded than it was designed for, and so he was given the High Estrogen birth control pill technology to help. He promised free distribution worldwide, but was instead killed by the CIA and the secret conspiracy groups of the New World Order, who make money on overpopulation, the following year. I would like to cover the entire ET meeting, because it meant so much to society, but lack the space and time. It began the Civil Rights Era of the 1960's. I was not at the meeting, but spoke with more than one (of the alien beings) that was. Martin Luther King, Jr., once told me "Rather than fighting and hating each other, it is better to sit down and talk peacefully. We still might not get along, but at least we will understand each other better." Yes, I also dated Janis Joplin. Get over it.

### **Comments on the Mayor's Speech:**

Mayor Faulconer's January 12, 2017 State of the City Speech: "Last year, we changed the way we address homelessness. Instead of investing in a bed, we're investing in people. For years the City's answer to homelessness was just providing a bed for the night. Warehousing people in an outdoor tent. It wasn't enough. So we found a better way. The Council and I backed a new approach that focuses on addressing the roots of homelessness." (A)

(A) The "Roots of Homelessness" are the City tearing down 15 thousand inexpensive housing units the past 10 or 12 years, of course. The City has not addressed this, instead blaming "access services" as the "cause" of homelessness. What he is trying to say is that people are homeless because of mental illness, drug abuse, or alcoholism, which is very ridiculous, but something people like to hear.

"Today, homeless individuals and veterans can find shelter and access services under one roof, and start their transition to a better life. In fact, thanks to the support of Father Joe's Villages, the number of people we've transitioned off the streets compared to last year has more than doubled." (B)

(B) Yes, twice as many became housed in 2016, compared with 2015, but that same process also caused an equal number who were already housed in 2016 to become homeless and on the streets. Sidewalk homeless were housed at Father Joe's, which was full, by throwing out those already living there. Is that any sort of a success? The number of sidewalk homeless doubled in 2016 as a result of the City tearing down twice as many inexpensive housing rental units as usual.

"We're on the right path, but there's still much more to do. A majority of our homeless funding comes from the federal government. But as San Diego's homeless population has grown, our funding levels have not. So I will continue to call on Washington to provide San Diego the resources we need and that we deserve. My goal is for everyone to have the opportunity to share in our city's success." (C)

(C) On the right path, or on the **Right** path? HUD has had entirely enough of San Diego **causing more homeless problems than it solves,** especially when the "solution" actually causes more homeless than there were before that "solution". (This has gone on for more than 50 years!) Also, the "re-purposing" (embezzlement) of Federal funds, plus a lack of Transparency, make San Diego a place lucky to get housing money at all. There is no point in trying to solve the homeless problem while the City makes the problem worse every year by its real estate policies, using its "Civic San Diego", the parent agency of the Downtown Partnership - Clean and Safe.

"I'm proud to announce the Housing Our Heroes initiative – a call to action to help one thousand homeless veterans get the housing they deserve!" (D)

(D) This is a repeat of his promise two years ago, which failed, and he is making the same promise again. This will be repeated until he leaves office, of course.

"First, for veterans who are already on the streets, I am working with San Diego landlords to open their doors." (E)

(E) If you look at the SDSU data accumulated by Dr. Sue Lindsay, only **4 veterans were housed in two years** due to landlord involvement. Most with vouchers cannot find any landlords interested. There is no housing that exists for those vouchers to be used at.

"And we are ramping up our rapid-rehousing program. I'm working with the San Diego Housing Commission, which has already identified the funds we need to ensure veterans have enough money for a security deposit, first, and last month's rent." (F)

(F) Rapid Rehousing does not usually work in cities like San Diego, which have very high housing prices plus very low wages. We do, however, appreciate this effort.

"And we'll be working closely with the County Board of Supervisors to help these heroes receive the care they need. Sometimes the key to a better life is as simple as a key to a home you can call your own. This is a priority. I'm going to propose to the Council an action to dedicate four million dollars of this twelve million initiative toward the men and women who have dedicated their lives to protecting us. We will work to stop homelessness among veterans before it starts. **The challenges are complicated."** (G)

(G) The challenges are NOT complicated. The City tearing down all the inexpensive housing is the ONLY problem, and it is the one not being addressed at all. 10 to 20 units are razed for every one new "Affordable Housing" unit created, and even that new unit costs two or three times the money to rent of those units torn down.

"This year we will help one thousand homeless veterans get off the streets!" (H)

(H) I heard that for two years now, and it has never been true. Good goal, but nothing can work while the City makes the problem worse every year.

Conclusions: More babble, less action, the City Cover-Up continues. We homeless cannot get any cooperation from anywhere, it seems. We have ten thousand individuals identified on the sidewalks (actual university research data which identifies each one of them individually by picture identification) who are willing to give us their Social Security Numbers and identify themselves, but there must also be at least that same number, and probably twice that many who

will not identify themselves, risking the repercussion of being black-balled from employment and housing for life. Earth to Mayor Faulconer: Your cover-up is not working.

# Coalition For Basic Dignity, Think Dignity

The Coalition For Basic Dignity met the first Thursday of January (the 5th), per usual, at the Monicker Warehouse, 705 16th St., as guests of Think Dignity, which was formerly called Girls Think Tank. The meeting was held upstairs, on the second floor. 13 attended, which included 5 homeless, 3 lawyers, and 5 community leaders. • HEAL, the arts program, was a success, and will be expanding from Ocean Beach to also now Pacific Beach. • The Women's Subcommittee is studying women and homelessness, and will be concentrating on Sexual Assault. They inspired a treatise that I wrote on Sexual Assault, which can be had at

My idea, patterned after the Latrobe Free Store, Melbourne, Australia. • There is a new video out, and an attorney from Los Angeles attended today's meeting to start a similar group as this there. www.ThinkDignity.Org. • Four mobile showers locations continue to provide showers to our homeless. • We were represented at the Public Safety and Livability Committee regarding police racism. • People were asked what they want on the agenda for 2017. I asked for a viable plan to end homelessness in San Diego, possibly using my 5.1 Regional Plan for a starting point.

Other ideas included a weekly newsletter, more use of Facebook, and collaboration with the Urban Collaborative Project in Southeast San Diego. They have a 2- year pilot plan to address community trauma. • Other news is a lawsuit against CalTrans for stealing and destroying the possessions of homeless, and it is called Sanchez vs. CalTrans. If you know of anyone who has had their things taken by CalTrans, contact the lawyers of Think Dignity at www.ThinkDignity.Org. • There were complaints that Clean and Safe downtown were harassing homeless constantly, and this was "Not ethical nor moral". See the following message regarding harassment:

A message from Think Dignity: When someone is being harassed, do not assume that you must confront the harasser. Directly confronting someone can be risky, because you can

become a target, too. In many situations, another option is to talk to the person being harassed. You can ask if he or she needs help or anything from you at the moment. Ask someone else for help. If you don't feel safe intervening yourself, you can ask someone else to step in. That could be a law enforcement officer, but it could also be a bus driver, train conductor, teacher, or other authority figure, or simply another bystander. If you can't intervene during the incident, you can still help afterward. They might want someone to go with them to their destination or to help report the incident to law enforcement or an anti-harassment group. Just hearing that someone else saw and recognized the harassment can be helpful for some people. ♦♦♦♦♦♦ Next meeting is Feb. 2, 2017, 6 PM, 705 16th St., first or second floor. beginning 3 AM. • Before the meeting, I was asked why the RTFH and RCCC hired a Sacramento-based consulting firm, rather than hiring someone from San Diego, to come up with a Regional Plan to abate homelessness. I independently wrote Regional plan, my 5.1 Plan, at <a href="http://nz9f.com/yahoo\_site\_admin/assets/docs/51\_Regional\_Plan.351135">http://nz9f.com/yahoo\_site\_admin/assets/docs/51\_Regional\_Plan.351135</a> 500.pdf. I replied that my plan is to end homelessness, not just create a plan to obtain HUD funding, and deal with the homeless that the City creates. Neither the City nor the County is interested in a plan like mine, which would actually work. Sad? Yes, because all of the efforts of all of the service providers are just money paid to obscure the truth and hide the fact that nothing effective is being done. • After the meeting, representatives from 2 help agencies approached me and expected me to ask them for help, but I had asked both agencies for help years ago and was denied. One agency refused to give me food at their food pantry because I could not prove an address, and they suggested I go to a different neighborhood where they have programs for the homeless. I said I couldn't walk that far. I didn't say it, but in the past, the food in those places has been way too poisoned. ◆◆◆◆◆◆

**EDITORIAL:** First, the service providers are not a solution for homelessness, nor are they really a form of help for the homeless, because the help they give is too late in the game, after the homeless have been caused real damage, making the homeless now substance abusers and/or mentally ill. **Second**, the service providers help the City and County deal with the mess caused by real estate practices. They also help to establish a smoke-screen, making it look like homelessness is about mental illness and substance abuse, not housing. **Third**, any correct plan involves **not tearing down so much inexpensive housing**, thus no longer forcing so many new people onto the sidewalk, followed by their becoming substance abusers and then mentally ill. met Thursday, Jan. 19, 2017, at the San Diego County Health Services Complex, 3851 Rosecrans St., 3-5 PM. 64 were present. None of the business of the Board needed the immediate attention of the homeless, except one item, a **Nonagenda Public Comment** by myself: •

"I'm Dr. John Kitchin, Ph.D. in Applied Psychology, and I've been a homeless advocate 30 years in San Diego. I'm considered a spokesperson for the homeless because I've published the San Diego Homeless News the past 8 years. • Since Metro San Diego County and City have had no homeless plan the past two years, and are in danger of losing funding as a result, I wrote the 5.1 Regional Plan, and published it at

http://nz9f.com/yahoo site admin/assets/docs/51 Regional Plan.35113550 O.pdf and in my newspaper. It is currently being used by San Diego County as an interim plan pending your official plan that is being begun today. It was my intention all along to kick-start the process by producing a starting point for those outside San Diego and unfamiliar with our unusual circumstances, namely the Border and the Navy. San Diego County has already acted on some of the suggestions in my plan. • It's a real, viable, workable plan, not just Public Relations propaganda from a prestigious planning group, intended to secure public support and Federal tax money. I will work with your plan group if requested to do so. Both homelessness and solutions are paramount in the politics of the local economy. My strongest suits are ideas and the ability to accomplish huge things using very little money."

Here, a homeless person is writing a Regional Plan so that San Diego finally has one, so do the nonprofits rescue the homeless, or is it the other way around? Double meaning.

## A San Diego Homeless Primer:

New to the mess? Get up-to-speed quickly.

San Diego has at least 15,000 women who participate in "sex-housing", living with men as one of their "collection" instead of

having to pay rent. It also has thousands who live in underground sewers, on rooftops in air conditioning units, and many other options. The recently written "5.1 Regional Plan" is written to be understood by the public, and gives some of the abbreviations and regulations currently in use. http://nz9f.com/yahoo site admin/assets/docs/Best of the San Diego Homeless News. 217181738.pdf, which covers our first 4 years (of 8 years). After that, there were a few Emergency Editions that deserve attention, including our latest emergency awhile back,

Most editions can be found on PDF Page, which is <u>NZ9F.com/PDF</u>. That page also contains resources and college courses.

So much for the San Diego Homeless News. On to our website, NZ9F.com, my amateur radio callsign. Ham operators of the highest engineering class are assigned 4-digit call letters, sort of like KFMB or KPBS. Since it is a tiny name which identifies me in the radio data-bases worldwide, I used it as a web address. It is published by the Homeless Editorial Board, which was once called the Homeless Board, and before that was known as the Homeless Action Team, and then the Homeless Advocacy Team.

We operate **HEN**, **the Homeless Emergency Network**, which notifies police, government, and the homeless, when there is an emergency. Sign up at Twitter.com/@NZ9F. No tweets except emergencies, or whenever our newspaper is published (for a periodic test of the system).

Periodic news updates can be had on Preview Page, NZ9F.com/SDHNpreview, which is an ongoing mockup of the newspaper to next be published. National News Wire Service, for the news media regarding stories originating in San Diego and dealing with the homeless situation is on Media Page, NZ9F.com/M. It is not very frequent that Media Page is activated, but when it is, we go out to a massive number of news agencies worldwide. We are sometimes the key station in the Underground News Network.

Local news bulletins are found in our Header, which is on top of each and every web page of the site. There is also a Blog, but largely not updated very often, which is true of most of the website. The website has an index to find services. It also has humor to prevent suicides. Often, information from MAPSS, the Metropolitan Association of Providers of Social Services is given via PDF, Word, bulletin, or included in the newspaper. These are often the latest updates of important things. Local meetings of appropriate groups are also covered. Some unusual things on our website include ALTS page, <a href="NZ9F.com/alts">NZ9F.com/alts</a>, which gives the Windows weird symbols and stuff. Check it out sometime. I created it so I could use it, but you can, too.
